

POLITICAL TESTAMENT

of

NICOLAE RADESCU

Beloved Friends, Loyal Associates in the Fight
for Romanian Liberation, and Fellow-Countrymen:

When you read these words I shall be no more. When that day will be I do not know. While my heart is strong and my mind is clear, Death may be a matter of months or it may be a matter of days, or even of hours. I am in the hands of God.

In this moment of my life I am conscious of a last paramount duty to my beloved country and its people -- enslaved and in exile. That duty is to inscribe my final words of counsel and advice to those who will succeed me in the leadership of the Cause of our country's liberation. I do so with the profound humility and in all the integrity and candor that the imminence of Death commands.

II

At my advanced age I had no hope of living to see the day of our country's liberation. My only hope was to achieve the vital objective of establishing a sound basis from which the fight for liberation can be conducted by others. For that purpose God has spared me.

In the LEAGUE OF FREE ROMANIANS I leave you the organism through which the vital energies, the talents and the genius of the Romanian forces in exile can be mobilized into a purposive movement of national solidarity and unity dedicated to the Cause. Today, the League is a functioning reality, a network of associations of Romanian exiles throughout the Free World. It is democratically representative in its organization; is responsive to democratic control; and is fired with a sense of sacred mission.

The principles on which the League was founded and the purposes of its organization were broadcast to Romanians everywhere in my LIBERATION MANIFESTO issued on the eighth anniversary of the Communist seizure of power in our native land. Their response to the Manifesto leaves no doubt that these principles and purposes are clearly understood and approved by the overwhelming majority of Romanians in exile as the League's mandate of future attitude and action.

All of this is only the beginning of a struggle which will be hard and long. The hopes of our unfortunate countrymen behind the Iron Curtain depend in great measure on the spirit of integrity, solidarity and sacrifice with which all Romanians in exile rally to the Cause. This is the sacred trust which Destiny has placed upon them. The supreme task of my successors in leadership will be to maintain this spirit as a vital principle of action.

It is my hope that my successor to the leadership of the League will be chosen from among four of my old friends:

GRIGORE GAFENCU, the distinguished former Foreign Minister of Romania;

GENERAL GHEORGHE ION, one of our most brilliant soldier-statesmen;

MIHAIL FARCASANU, a farsighted and able political leader; and

VIOREL V. TILEA, a leading personality in our country's public life.

Each of these men by his record of service to our nation and by his talents, is qualified for the exacting tasks of leadership. Each in his field is well known to the governments of the Free World and their leaders. Each is dedicated to the principles of Democracy.

Whoever is selected, it is my solemn request that the others give him their unreserved and loyal support in the supreme cause of our country's liberation.

IV

There is one solemn thought which above all others I wish to leave not only with my successors but with all of my countrymen. The years of Nazi domination and of war, followed by the Communist enslavement of our people, have destroyed the image of our native land as we knew it before World War II. Our old people are tired, bitter, and utterly sapped of hope by tyranny, privation and betrayal. The ranks of our middle-aged men have been decimated by war. Many spared in war perished in concentration camps and torture chambers.

It is our YOUTH who must hold high the torch of Romanian freedom. My successors in leadership must realize that they are but the trustees of a new generation's hopes and aspirations for the future. The first bold outlines of that future have been nobly etched by the exiles of the enslaved countries of Central and Eastern Europe in the Philadelphia and Williamsburg Charters.

These charters of hope have captured the imagination of our YOUTH -- enslaved and in exile. The future of Liberation is theirs -- to cherish, to capture, and to hold. No liberation movement of exiles can succeed without them; none is worth striving for that does not have their confidence and trust, and above all their vital participation.

It is my prayer that the elders of the Cause will begin building its future leadership under the aegis of our YOUTH at the earliest moment. It is my hope and dearest wish for my country that its young patriots of proven records in the Resistance Movement should assume a major role in the leadership of the Cause. I am addressing myself particularly to BARBU NICULESCU, LEONTIN CONSTANTINESCU, VASILE DUMITRESCU, ADRIANA GEORGESCU -- and to other Romanian young men and women of similar courage and outlook. It is on such as they that the future of our native land depends.

On behalf of my countrymen, enslaved or in exile, I leave with all of these benefactors the assurance of our profound appreciation.

I wish to record my deepest indebtedness to Mr. J. Anthony Panuch for the invaluable advice and counsel which he gave freely and generously, and for his faith in the integrity and sincerity of our purpose. I earnestly bespeak his wisdom, courage, and above all his friendship, for the guidance and inspiration of my successors.

GEORGE PALADE, I wish to record a gratitude beyond words, for his professional care and filial devotion in my last illness. To my constant companion and trusted friend, BARBU NICULESCU, who many years ago sacrificed a brilliant career to join me in the fight against tyranny, I owe my life. May God spare and protect him for the restoration of our native land after liberation.

And now, an old soldier whose life has been spent in the service of his bountry and its people, bids farewell to the land he loves and will never see again. Farewell and Hope -- to his countrymen enslaved behind the Iron Curtain. Farewell and Courage -- to those who fought by his side against Nazi and Communist tyranny, and who will continue the struggle for Liberation.

For you who remain, particularly our YOUTH, there is the promise of a brighter tomorrow -- a tomorrow when our country and its people will be freed of the Powers of Darkness. That is an ideal worth living and fighting for. To you I leave my unfulfilled hopes, dreams and prayers for its realization.
